



MD03 TERM LIMITS POLL: EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

US Term Limits Survey of 423 Likely Democratic Party Primary Voters in MD03
 Conducted by RMG Research, February 19-26, 2024

Survey Summary: The results of this recently completed Maryland’s 3rd Congressional District survey show that MD03 democratic voters overwhelmingly support term limits for members of Congress. Support for term limits is broad across all political and demographic groups. **An overwhelming 80% of the voters approve of an amendment to the U.S. Constitution that will place term limits on U.S. Senators and U.S. House Representatives.** Of the respondents who support term limits, 60% want 6-years total or less as the limit.

The survey also reveals that when respondents learn that one of the candidates, Juan Dominguez, is the only term limits supporter in the race, he jumps to a commanding lead over the other candidates.

Methodology

The survey of 423 Likely Democratic Party Primary Voters was conducted online for USTL on February 19-26, 2024. Field work for the survey was conducted by RMG Research, Inc. Certain quotas were applied, and the sample was lightly weighted by gender, age, and race. Likely voters were determined by a screening process within the survey. The margin of sampling error for the full sample is +/- 4.8 percentage points.
